SDOP has telephone number. For the first time in SDOP history we have a telephone number. Without a facility or an office a phone number was not an option. But why so much to do about a phone number? Since its creation I have gotten numerous calls concerning membership by interested persons. 541-581-0378 currently forwards to my home phone but can be directed to any person the board would choose in the future.

Our SDOP membership profiles and ancestors database now resides in the information "cloud". Data is now accessible to authorized persons. This allows for sharing of information by the officers such as the president or treasurer or others as needed. This database was built on the foundation maintained by Merle Miller for many years. Our treasurer Mary Laws and her husband Jim have done a great job taking on the new database maintenance. Dues payments and membership profiles are managed by Mary keeping the board updated to the day on membership topics.

As you may have read in a prior issue of this newsletter Mary had indicated she needed to retire from her position as treasurer so our concern was who would take over her very crucial duties. After a few weeks and a bit of encouragement Dave Thompson has stepped up. Dave has a great background and will fill this position with competence.

SDOP now has a website! If you are able please take minute and visit our new website oregonsdop.org. Cleve Parker, a board member has lead this effort and the results are outstanding. It shares information about SDOP to both members and interested persons. Pictures of events, applications for membership and member only information will reside on the website. Soon you will be able to use your email address as your access key and review data from our pioneer ancestor files.

Our member's generosity was recognized and will continue to be recognized in our newsletter. These donation monies are funding our SDOP expenses in order to keep dues at a lower level, newsletter printing expense and Heritage Projects identified by the Board as areas we want to support to meet our mission as a historical society.

Corporate donations are now in place with "smile. amazon.com" and Fred Meyer. A portion of your purchases without any expense to members and other interested persons is forwarded to SDOP. Board Member Amy Martin has lead our efforts on this important work.

The SDOP Trading Post is off and running this past year! The prices are competitive and the quality of the merchandise is exceptional. SDOP reaps a commission on each of your and others purchase. SDOP holds no inventory and does not need to have members involved in the shipping and handling of these products. It is a win for SDOP. Immediate-Past President Drew Ackerlund has done an outstanding job bringing this project to fruition.



SDOP has no facilities as I mentioned earlier but we do have our Heritage. That Heritage is in the form of family stories and documents relating their Pioneer Ancestors trip across the plains. SDOP also has documents relating these stories and early members of SDOP and SDOP activities. Marsha Ackerlund is leading the work to digitize these documents so they can be reviewed by members on the newly established SDOP Website.

Our social media is being marshaled by a retired Army Major Wes Potter. He is managing our SDOP Facebook account. For organizations Facebook is known as the poor man's webpage and he lead our first effort on the internet in reminding the public SDOP is alive and well.


SDOP Award Winners 2016



Miss Pioneer Oregon is Abigail Walker. She receives a \$250 check.

Abby is a junior at Hood River Valley High School. Her parents are Eric and Trisha Walker. Her pioneer ancestor is Catherine Abbott who arrived in Oregon in 1852. Her interests are basketball, reading, art, student government and her skills/talents are writing, drawing and academics. She was our high school essay winner last year, and has recently won the Christopher Columbus American History Essay contest for Oregon State Daughters of the American Revolution.

Brandon Irving receives the scholarship of \$1000. The check goes to Oregon State University where he is a freshman. He is in the College of Business majoring in accounting, finance, or entrepreneurship. He has joined Lambda Chi Alpha fraternity, the Billiards Club, and the Austin Entrepreneurship Program at OSU. He worked at Kumon, an after-school learning program for kids to gain success in math and reading during high school. He lives in Tigard. His Wilson ancestors came to Oregon in 1845.

Book Alert for Oregon Pioneers

I'm always looking for great books to share with my 4th graders about the pioneers and one of my favorite books tells the story of Henderson Luelling (also spelled Lewelling), who traveled to Oregon in 1847. Their wagon did not have the usual items we think of that our forefathers brought with them: this wagon had 700 plants and young fruit trees! These trees became the source of fruit trees for many homestead orchards in the Oregon Territory, and his son, Seth, is credited with introducing the Bing cherry, in honor of a Chinese foreman who worked in his orchard.



This true story is told in tall tale fashion by Deborah Hopkinson, who is an Oregon author. The back of the book has additional information on the Luellings. My students love this book and I'm sure you will too.
