Champoeg's Founders' Day Celebration

Hosted by Friends of Historic Champoeg

It was a beautiful sunny day with a strong wind to keep it cool at the Founders' Day celebration at Champoeg State Heritage Area on Saturday, May 4th. Participants walked into the lives of the Kalapuya Indians, French Canadian fur trappers and American settlers, and experienced their world for an afternoon.

While walking along an easy, scenic one-mile trail, visitors stopped at five living history stations and interacted with characters from the past. They saw a trapper encampment, engaged in the daily life of the 1850's at the original town site, heard tales of the harrowing flood that wiped the town of Champoeg off the map, and heard about the first Founders' Day celebration of 1901 – the event that commemorated the first government in the Pacific Northwest.

Sons and Daughters of Oregon Pioneers participated in two ways. Co-Presidents Nancy Root Parker and Diane Root greeted visitors in the Pavilion. They gave out brochures, the recent Boomer and Senior News article, shared information about SDOP, and decorated with SDOP mugs. The scrapbooks of SDOP history and photos of pioneer ancestors were very popular with the participants.

Miss Pioneer Oregon, Bethany Janzen, participated at the pioneer life station. We hear she was a big hit with the bowling activity.

Oregon-California Trails Convention



The Oregon-California Trails Association is holding their 2013 Annual Convention in Oregon City the week of July 21st. The theme for this year's convention is "End of the Trail and Beyond." Most of the events will be held

at the host hotel, the Monarch Hotel and Conference Center, 12566 SE 93rd Ave, Clackamas, OR 97015 (1-800-492-8700 or www.monarchhotel.cc).

By the time you read this, registration packets should have been mailed to all OCTA members. You can get one from Jim Tompkins (tompkins@bctonline.com or 503-880-8507) or you can register on line (go to www.octa-trails.org and click on the 2013 convention link).

The convention is open to anybody, membership is not required to attend. There are activities every day and most evenings for the week the OCTAns (rutnuts) will be in town. Attendees will choose from a mix of learning sessions, tours and outings, and special events. Anyone attending all sessions will have a very busy week.

There will be two days of speaker sessions, workshops, and meetings. One of the speaker sessions on Tuesday will feature SDOP. A panel of trail descendants (Champ Vaughan, Chris Meinicke, Diane Root, and Jim Tompkins) will speak to what it means to be related to someone who came over the trail. There will be five days of outings and tours. Pre-convention outings include trips along the Cowlitz Trail, the Applegate, and the Oregon Trail from Pendleton to The Dalles. Convention tours will go around Mt. Hood looking at the Barlow Road, Oregon City, a missions tour of the Willamette Valley and a settlements tour of French Prairie. A post-convention outing will go to Fort Vancouver. Another activity of interest to SDOP is the first time ever (for OCTA) Heritage Resources Fair on Monday afternoon where attendees may mingle with representatives of as many as 70 heritage organizations (museums, genealogical

as 70 heritage organizations (museums, genealogical societies, historical societies, etc.) including SDOP.
Evening events include an Awards Banquet and Live Auction; an authors night featuring two dozen trail related authors; a Living History Night at the Abernethy Center with re-creations of Abigail Scott Duniway, Father Luigi Rossi, and Narcissa Whitman; and a Salmon Dinner at the End of the Oregon Trail Center.

In Their Own Words - excerpts from journals from the Oregon Trail - complied by Jim Tompkins

"Gentlemen, they do say, that out in Oregon the pigs are running about under the great acorn trees, round and fat, and already cooked, with knives and forks sticking in them so that you can cut off a slice whenever you are hungry. Now gentlemen, as many of you as would like to go, walk right into my store and put down your names in the book," — Peter Burnett, 1843

"We had iron pots and teakettles for cooking, and did our baking in a Dutch oven with coals under and over it. It was difficult for my mother and sisters to cook this way, as we had been used to a large house, a cook stove and brick oven, and a maid to do the hard work. When our cow gave plenty of milk, we put the milk in a large, tin can and hung this can on the wagon, where the jolting would churn the milk to butter." — Sarah Sprenger, 1852

"July 4th. They are playing fiddles and dancing. 9t recalls old times to me. 9 can shut my eyes and think 9 am at some gathering just like 9 used to be. After Helen and 9 sat on the hill and moralized so serious, we came down and cut capers like a parcel of fools." —Agnes Stewart, 1853

"About noon of the tenth day, after leaving the Dalles, we began to see, through the timber, on ahead a vision of an open valley. Peering out, I saw that it was sprinkled over with spreading oaks, while it seemed to be surrounded by a fringe of evergreens reaching up onto those mountains, and on into the blue sky above, I thought, 'Yes, this is the Oregon I have been hoping to get to.' "
