## **President's Note**

My term as your President of SDOP is quickly coming to an end, a responsibility that has keep me very busy this past year. It has been a year of many challenges such as getting more members to switch from hard copy Newsletters to receiving their Newsletters electronically. The second challenge is how to get more members actively involved in SDOP as board members or as committee members. The third challenge is to increase our membership by finding ways to increase SDOP's visibility. We are doing this by creating a Speaker's Staff to speak at historical functions and other organizations. We are also working to improved our website and develop a facebook page. Your help is needed in all these areas.

It has also been a year of developing new friendships while sharing Oregon's history and our pioneer ancestors. We visited Philip Foster Farm, located at the end of the Barlow Trail, in October of 2013. On April 26, 2014 we had a wonderful historical learning experience at the Fort Dalles Museum Complex. We toured the Surgeon's Quarters, the only remaining Officers house of the 1856 Fort Dalles Military complex. This museum opened in 1905 and is considered one of the oldest history museums in Oregon. Also on the complex is the Anderson log cabin/homestead built in the late 1800s by a Swedish immigrant. In addition the complex houses an historic collection of 30 wheeled vehicles such as a stage coach, two horse-drawn hearses, a couple of surreys and a mail wagon. By far I would say this was one of the best tours I've been on with SDOP. See pictures in this newsletter.

The last meeting of my administration is June 14, 2014. It is SDOP's annual meeting where new officers are elected and voting takes place on issues that affect all members such as a recommendation from the board for a By-law change. Please plan on attending. It is important that your voice is heard.

#### **Oregon Pioneer Association**

The Oregon Pioneer Association was organized on October 18, 1873. It's first president was F. X. Matthieu. Membership requirements changed slightly through the years, finally extending to those who arrived in the Oregon Territory prior to 1859, when Oregon gained statehood status. A 1948 article in the Oregonian listed the ten pioneers then living. In 1952, the association officially disbanded.

The association published fifty-six annual "Transactions" beginning in 1873. They recount the business affairs of the association, report on the Annual Reunion, and give honor to the pioneers. The final Transaction was printed after the fifty-sixth reunion, held in 1928, though it bears a publication date of 1933.

Content and format of these Transactions changed through out the years. Each year the business dealings of the association are reported. Also printed were the various speeches made at the reunion. These speeches----made by early Oregon leaders, historians, and other persons of import---covered a variety of topics. Biographies of the pioneers, lists of those who had died during the proceeding year, and lists of pioneers attending the reunion are also variously included. A concerted effort was made to publish a diary, group of letters, reminiscence, or other firsthand account of a pioneer's experience.

These records provide an invaluable resource about our early Oregon pioneers. Not only can they provide biographical data on the pioneers, but those first-hand accounts of the joys and sorrows of the journey to---and life in---early Oregon, give us a welcome view into the lives of our earliest citizens.

#### **The Dalles Meeting Notes**

Chris Meinicke reported she had attended a networking luncheon at the Oregon Historical Society for Oregon museums and historical organizations. OHS is considering traveling exhibits which she thought might be an area in which SDOP could help. Chris has promoted SDOP at the Feb 15th Genealogy Forum, at Friends of Multnomah Falls, and with Old Aurora Colony.

Glen Jones presented a proposed by-laws change which will be voted on at the annual meeting. Any member who is six months or more behind in their dues will be dropped as a member of SDOP. The current timeline is 2 years. Drew Ackerlund gave out the report on the banquet. We had 81 attend this year. In his Nomination Committee report, Drew stressed membership recruitment and needing to recruit officers and board members at this time. A web master is also needed. Membership: Merle Miller reported that dues were mailed. There are now 1,043 members. Roster: Mel Miller is working on the genealogy database. Glen is scanning applications. Mel handed out his draft of a new membership application.

Genealogical Forum of Oregon sent a thank you to Glen and Chris for participation. State Library update: still in committee and no public hearings yet. DAR Historical marker dedication May 10th at St. Louis Church, Gervais announced. DAR Historical marker dedication at Cherryville Cemetery six miles east of Sandy off Hwy 26 (52225 Cherryville Drive) announced. It will be on Sunday, June 8th at 2 pm.

SDOP is pleased to announce that we will be expanding the Ancestor data base in which we are collecting information. The SDOP membership application form is being expanded to include the information from new members and you may submit information for existing members by email. ## Oregon Family History Starkweather History

As I conclude my stint as SDOP newsletter editor, I considered what final article to write, and then my sister, Nancy, brought me a small book she had found. It is called "A History of Oregon" by Clark, Down and Blue. It was designed as a textbook for Oregon schools and the sticker in the back shows it was used in Benton County Schools. The preface, written in July 1931, drew my attention as it begins by giving credit to 4 organizations including Sons and Daughters of Oregon Pioneers! It states as follows:

"The introduction of Oregon History as a subject to be studied in the elementary school has been brought about by the combined efforts of four organizations: The History Teachers' Association, the Sons and Daughters of Oregon Pioneers, the Oregon Historical Society, and the Oregon Pioneer Association. Mr. Harvey G. Starkweather deserves special mention for his efforts in this matter. While president of the History Teachers' Section mentioned above, he brought the question of teaching Oregon history to the attention of the Superintendent of Public Instruction and helped to bring about the introduction of it as a subject of instruction as early as 1921."

Our own SDOP member and Past President, Nancy Hersey, is the daughter of Harvey G. Starkweather, and he was also a Past President of SDOP. She tells me he loved to tell stories of the pioneers..

#### Loeb History

I didn't have to wonder where this little green volume had come from. I would bet it was from my grandfather, Alfred A. Loeb's library on Oregon history. A.A. Loeb (1879-1956) was an Oregon history buff and my mother, Betty Loeb Root, told me that her Dad took the family to Oregon history sites like the site of Fort Clatsop long before there were markers or restorations.

Some of you who have traveled to Brookings, Oregon may have visited the Alfred A. Loeb State Park on the Chetco River. Grandfather Loeb and Uncle Al Loeb's business dealt in shipping burls to American, German and French furniture makers and veneer mills, and was known in the 1930's as the United States' largest dealer in burls. Burls are the semi-spherical woody growths on trees with wavy, curly, or swirled grain patterns that are prized by furniture makers and woodworkers. The very large burls at the base of walnut, maple, Pacific Madrona, redwood and Oregon Myrtle trees were used. The walnut burls were often obtained from old walnut orchards that were going to be replaced in California. Only selected forest trees were used, so the forest was largely still intact after harvesting burls.

When Grandfather bought a 160 acre section of land on the Chetco River for the myrtle burls there, he realized it was the largest stand and the biggest myrtle trees he had ever seen, and wished it to be preserved. He worked with the Save the Myrtlewood Association and the State Forestry Department to insure it became a park and other land was also donated to make up the park. The park, dedicated in 1949, includes oak, fir, maple and redwood as well as the myrtle trees which are unique to this area. Grandfather had a strong interest in preserving the beauty of Oregon and was a member of the Roadside Council who were engaged in preserving land along Oregon highways.

So if you visit this beautiful park on the Chetco River, you will now know how it came about, and also who Alfred A. Loeb was - the grandfather of the Root Sisters, our brother, Steve and great grandfather of Jacob Root of this newsletter!

#### Madame Dorion Dedication

The Madame Dorion Historical Marker Dedication on Saturday, May 10th, in Gervais Oregon was a huge success. It was the project of the Champoeg Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution. About 200 people gathered at the St. Louis Catholic Church to participate in the occasion that included a program of speeches in the church, followed by entertainment, refreshments and fellowship in the church hall. The marker is located to the left of the front steps of the church honoring "courageous pioneer, devoted loway mother, early Oregon settler" Marie Dorion who was buried under the original church building in September 1850.

Speakers included genealogist Connie Lenzen, DAR State Regent Ellen Hopkins, the 3rd great granddaughter of Marie Dorion - Jennifer Gobin-Bailes, and author Jane Kirkpatrick who wrote a poem for the celebration. Champoeg Chapter members Karen Garst, Diane Root,



Kris Nelson and Lois Streimer also spoke, and Father Jeffrey Eirvin gave the blessing. Many people contributed to the project. Of special note are Roger and Brenda Howard of Gervais.

Authors Jane Kirkpatrick and Lenora Rain-Lee Good signed their books on Marie Dorion. Costumed interpreter Richard Cassidy attended as an Oregon trapper. "Madame Dorion wine" samples were given out, and posters of the project and of Jennifer Gobin-Bailes' lineage were admired. Attendees included church members, DAR members, SDOP members, those interested in Oregon history, and descendants of the Lemery family who gave the land for the church.
