

I really want to thank everyone who donated to the Rose Parade fund! We had a little problem when the horse & carriage we have used the last few years had to cancel; but Mike Irving and Mel Fuller were able to find the McInnis' with their Clydesdales and excellent wagon to take us in the parade.

Six Clydesdales cost a little more, though, so we had to increase our donation goal amount from \$2,000 to \$2,800 at the last minute. And thanks to everyone who donated, we not only met, but exceeded that, with a final total of \$3,662.26 for the parade!! Thank you all!!

Every year we have seven Board meetings, and they are open to all members. Any SDOP member can attend any of the Board meetings. Two of them (November and January) are just plain, dry, dusty Board meetings. No additional fun. Another two are connected to our two main events each year: the Oregon Birthday Banquet in February, and our Annual Picnic in July.

Everyone pitched in to get everything done and ready to go at Memorial Coliseum at the start. We had challenges with needing boots for the horses to go through the Coliseum with the formal parade, but we found a great compromise to enable us to fold into the parade right as the parade exited the Coliseum and turned right onto Broadway. We even got them to do a special introduction and TV shots off to the side to include us in the main TV broadcast.

Since I was not actually in the parade, but just organizing our entry, I was able to watch from the street as we came through. I heard countless people make comments in wonderment and awe about the tall team of Clydesdales. I walked down the sidewalk to follow our entry toward the end of the parade route. The Pioneer Spirit

Americans can look back on the pioneer way of life and tell themselves that they can work hard, too, so that they can have their best life. The land that the pioneers came to had many different characteristics. There were coastal areas, fertile valleys, and deserts. This variety made a special country. The pioneers came from many different places in life, but they also came together to make something special.

Joe Meeks was one of the earliest pioneers to escort a wagon over the Oregon Trail. He's a good example of the settlers who were brave and determined enough to travel to Oregon. His neighbor said, "He was as brave as Julius Caesar." On his way from Virginia, he fought Indians, was attacked by a grizzly bear, and the people on the wagon train had many hardships. Eventually he settled in the Tualatin Valley, which is where I live. He became an important politician who helped the Oregon Territory become a state. He went to Washington D.C. a lot and knew President Buchanan. He did a lot of interesting things but made a lot of sacrifices. Joe Meeks showed me a lot about what the pioneer spirit was like.

Today you can still be a pioneer if you want to. You can explore space and the oceans. You can also study medicine and find new ways to cure diseases. Committee Reports

No Reports: Nomination, Social Media, Publicity, Trading Post, and Public Relations.

Registrar's Report: Merle reports that we've received many new requests for new membership. However, after being on the board for 27 years, and as Registrar for 15, he is resigning as Registrar as of the SDOP picnic, July 13. Chris suggested advertising in the next newsletter for a new registrar, and Dave suggested an email blast.

Information Technology Committee: Mel reported that QuickBooks shows there is \$4,811 in outstanding dues. Dues statements have been sent out, and for the first time some dues payments were received the day after the statements were e-mailed! Leave a Trail of Breadcrumbs For Your Family

I have been looking for breadcrumbs for my ancestors for over 30 years. I remember stories both my father and my mother could remember from when they were kids or young adults. Some of their stories were true and some had a crumb of truth that led me to fact and eliminate the questions along the way. As I have traveled both far and near, I have found so much great information and was so excited until I found the fact that proved it to be part truth.

In recent years our medical practitioners have started to document our medical histories. But as we had maybe changed doctors or gotten treatment elsewhere when not at home, I have found it more and more difficult to remember just what I had or had happened along the

way. A few years back I had to try to organize what I could remember to add to the records. Earlier this year (2019) I found a baby book my mother kept for me and one she kept for my brother. Inside of both books were many facts written at the time that my brother and I have both found out about ourselves. Thank goodness for some of it because the records showed we had both had the measles and lessened the concerns with the local breakouts in the Oregon and Washington area.

Along the way on my research trail I would ask my brother (who is 6 years older than I am) about different things. As they say in the law, if you have 4 witnesses you will get 4 stories or IDs and the like. So it was, with my brother and I. I have found the same thing with my 2 sons who are only 2 years apart.

There are so many events and activities in life that we hope our kids and their kids will grow to appreciate as they grow up. Unfortunately, we assume they will remember. Unfortunately, we hope we will remember. Unfortunately, no one remembers, and history of our family is long forgotten.

I want to strongly suggest if you have not done so in the past, start a diary or even just a short list of events (good or bad or just interesting) of your past and add to it from time to time. Make sure you leave a copy for your family where your executor can find them and share with your family. Make sure to leave it for family that is not as close as they would like to be.

A couple of years ago, due to some incorrect information in Ancestry, made contact with the great grand daughter of one of my favorite Aunts (my Dad's younger sister) who was only a year older than my Mom. I had never met my Aunts daughter even though we lived in the same city (Portland) because of our age difference (17 years). She had gotten married and moved away while I was just a toddler. Through this contact I was able to meet her twice since she now lived on the other side of the country in Florida. What a loss over the years. I was able to meet her son and daughter in Florida as well. I have yet to meet the great grand daughter who made this all possible. So keep in mind that bad or incorrect information can lead to some great results.

A family member recently made contact with two long lost Uncles. They were able to share information that helped them all grow closer. The lack of contact was due to a much earlier divorce between the parents of the Uncle's and the family members Grandmother. Again, time and distance kept them from knowing each other for all the years. Keep that in mind also when people become separated. Reach out a hand and you could find a warm and loving hand reaching back to you. As Pumba in the Lion King once said: put your past behind you. Bury the bad and look forward to sharing what was good. Share the crumbs with family and we all have a future to enjoy.


