Hi SDOP members and Rose Parade fans,


This year's Grand Floral Parade has gone from postponed to cancelled for 2020 due to COVID-19


#### **Book Reviews**

Here are some historical book recommendations by SDOP members:

Westering Women by Sandra Dallas published January 2020

I just finished reading a new book from author Sandra Dallas. It is her latest book, and if you haven't heard of her, you might want to check out this book and others she has written.

Even though this is not a story that takes place on the Oregon Trail, it is a pioneer story none



the less, and tells the story of sisterhood on the perilous wagon-trail west. The story begins in February 1852, where the main character, Maggie, sees these postings soliciting "eligible women" to travel to the gold mines of Goosetown, California. "If you are an adventuresome young woman of high moral character and fine health, are you willing to travel to California in search of a good husband? Maggie is a young seamstress with a small daughter and several painful secrets. She joins 43 other women and 2 reverends on the dangerous 2,000- mile journey west. Through hardships, and triumphs these women get to know each other, and Maggie finds that she is not the only one with secrets to hide. What will these women do to protect their own?

I thought this was a good read, as it tells the story from women's point of view, one which we rarely come across when reading about our pioneer ancestors. The story mentions historical landmarks along the trail and I found the book to be full of action as when it seemed like one travesty was overcome, another one took its place.
