Bowman Museum

Crook County values its history and how the community's cow-boy heritage and Western roots have formed what the community is today. The museum offers an abundance of resources and exhibits and safely preserves Crook County's rich history. Built in 1910 using stone from a guarry just west of the Ochoco Viewpoint, the building was donated by the Bowman family and operated as a bank for 22 years. When the Bowman family gave the building to the people of Crook County, the Historical Society assumed its operations, and volunteers went to work transforming it into the A.R. Bowman Museum. In 1991, the Bowman Museum was entered on the National Register of Historic Places. In 2008, a campaign was conducted to raise the money to purchase and renovate a contiguous building. The History Center includes exhibits covering Native American neighbors to homesteaders, and from farming and ranching to logging and Les Schwab's story. It also includes a history and genealogical research library and a large community event room. In late 2017, a City of Prineville Railway caboose exhibit opened on the site. The caboose display honors the railway's 100th anniversary in 2018, and the railway's impact on local history. In mid-March 2024 the Crook County Historical Society is again adding a new building, The Belknap Exhibit Center, a replica home front of one of the first doctors in Prineville. This building will house traveling and changing exhibits, as well as, become a place where small groups can meet. We are proud of the little corner on 3rd and Main in Prineville, Oregon where we honor our heritage and keep local history alive.

Secretary:

Joyce del Rosario read the Minutes from February 11, 2023 Annual Membership meeting submitted by Corporate Secretary 2022-2023, Dave Thompson. Having accepted a minor spelling correction, minutes were unanimously approved.

Committee Reports:

Debbie Pedersen reported four (4) new donations: one (1) Banquet, two (2) scholarships, one (1) general. Ongoing financial support is very appreciated.

Membership/Registrar:

Debbie Pedersen reported 3 new members: one senior, Sandra S. Silva, one adult life, Kirsten N. Witter, second Senior, Dianna M. Aguilar. All with pioneer ancestors in 1852. map with coordinates based on family address of record and interesting points. This project is designed to help SDOP members find a sense of place and make more connections. Interesting note, if SDOP ancestors rode on the wagon train together, their donation land claims might be near each other as well. Treasurer's Report:

Shauna Noon, reported last December, a couple months ago, more is available to view closer on a large screen tv. Bank Balances Checking and Saving and CDs one hundred seventy-two thousand (\$172,000), of that five thousand four hundred nine dollars (\$5,409) in checking. Overall, income statement (income vs. expenses) dues are being collected for FY 2024 began July 1, dues are down nine hundred five 905. However, most are paid in June falls in last FY. OFFICER REPORTS

SECRETARY: Joyce reported Minutes were published in SDOP News.

PRESIDENT: Jeanne asked Chris and Shauna to be on the panels for meetings at the genealogical groups.

TREASURER: Shauna reported SDOP is projected to be in the black this fiscal year.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Gouge Eye / Drewsey, Oregon



Oregon has a few unusual city names, such as Drain, Boring, and Zig Zag. Did you know that back in 1883 there was a town named Gouge Eye? It was apparently named Gouge Eye to "commemorate the frontier method of settling disputes", with a punch in the face.

SDOP member Sharon Ward Sullivan's

pioneer ancestors, the Wards, settled in the town of Gouge Eye around the early 1880s. Originally the land around Gouge Eye was the Malheur Indian Reservation for the Paiute tribes. However, they were later relocated to other Western reservations, opening up the land for homesteaders. This is an area along the Middle Fork of the Malheur River, about 40 miles northeast of Burns, Oregon

Mr. Abner Robbins opened a store in this area and gave the place the name of "Gouge eye". When Mr. Robbins applied for a post office to be located in his store, the postal authorities would not accept the name of "Gouge Eye", so he changed the name to "Drusy".

But, when the Post Office was established in 1884, it was registered under the name "Drewsey". There is some dispute about how the name got changed from Drusy to Drewsey, but that remains the name of this little community. The town grew rapidly in the late 19th century, from a population of 40 in 1889 to about 200 in 1907, with farming and sheep ranching as its economic base.

Today the town consists of a small number of homes, a tavern, a restaurant, two churches, and an elementary school. Drewsey is located about 45 miles East of Burns, OR, about 2 miles North of HWY 20 on Drewsey Rd.
