# From Chris Meinicke




Greetings to all descendants of the Oregon Territory Pioneer Families and the Friends of SDOP.

This is my last President's Letter to you as President of SDOP from the term starting in July 2024 and ending in June 2025. It has been a pleasure serving as your president again. For new members, I was President in the years 2013-2014 and in 2021-2022. I strongly believe in the importance of this organization, for keeping the spirit, memories and stories of our pioneer families alive for future generations. Especially in today's world, when there is so little focus on history of Oregon and/or of the history of the United States.

At the June 14, 2025 meeting I'll be presenting the SDOP gavel to Joy'e Willman as the new president of SDOP. The June 14<sup>th</sup> meeting location is at the Butteville Store at 10 AM. Tour after the June 14<sup>th</sup> meeting is at the Newell Pioneer Village. The tour includes touring Dr. Newell's House, the Butteville School, Butteville Jail and the Pioneer Memorial Mother's Cabin. Dr. Newell was one of the signers of Oregon's Provisional Government. You don't want to miss this tour and meeting! The actual planning meeting takes place prior to our Annual Picnic on July 12, 2025 at the pavilion in Champoeg State Park. The meeting is open to all members. The meeting starts promptly at 10:00 am. Please, bring your suggestions for Historical location meetings/tour sites and be prepared to determine the dates for our 2025-2026 **meetings.** We try to get all the meeting dates and locations for the coming year firmed up at this meeting so they can be published in the July Newsletter. The Memorial Day weekend might be when many of you visit the graves of your pioneer ancestors. One cemetery worth visiting is Canemah Cemetery in the old town of Canemah. I think it is the oldest plotted cemetery in Oregon. The Cemetery was started in the early 1830s and is only open today for burial to relatives of early pioneers. I've been visiting this cemetery for years and recently visited this cemetery again when checking out the Camas fields on Canemah Bluff. Canemah means "canim or Canoe" in the Chinook language. Canemah was a major canoe landing by the bluff and was a sacred place for Native Americans. It is located a short distance up river from Willamette Falls. There are many old graves like the one shown here. I've already been notified

by one member of SDOP that he has pioneer relatives buried at Canemah. The cemetery is within the Canemah Bluff Nature Park today.





I look forward to seeing many SDOP members at the upcoming meetings. I encourage all of you to celebrate your pioneer ancestor, to share your stories at SDOP meetings and to become an active member of Sons and Daughters of Oregon Pioneers. We are always looking for new Board Members.

Betty has lived all her adult life on 5 acres in Shelton, Washington. She and her husband acquired the 5 acres when they married in 1951.



# **FEATURED BOOK**



In 1868 the celebrated Civil War photographer Alexander Gardner traveled to Fort Laramie to document the federal government's treaty negotiations with the Lakota and other tribes of the northern plains. Gardner, known for his iconic portrait of Abraham Lincoln and his visceral pictures of the Confederate dead at Antietam, posed six federal peace commissioners with a young Native girl wrapped in a blanket. The hand-labeled prints carefully name each of the men, but the girl is never identified. As The Girl in the Middle goes in search of her, it draws readers into the entangled lives of the photographer and his subjects.

# **Queries from Members**

Charles Dejanvier is looking for SDOP members who have ancestors related to his ancestors, Jonathan January 1853 and Ebenezer and Susannah (Butler) Blatchly. They came in 1854, via the Oregon Trail. Their daughter Elizabeth married Jonathan on August 22nd, 1858. Jonathan and Elizabeth had eleven children: Wesley Winfield, Cassius M. (Dick), Philena Arminta, Martha Ann (Annie), Susan Ellen, John Ryneer, Sarah A., William Alexander (who later changed his last name to DeJanvier thinking it was the original name from Europe, but it was just Janvier), George Benjamin, Maude Arwilda and Katherine.

With the size of families back in the 1800s, at least in his family, Charles is sure there are pioneer descendants related to him that he is not aware of. He would love to get in contact with anyone related to fill the holes of his family tree and sharing family stories. He would like to share a lot of the family information from the book <u>BLATCHLEY PHYSICIANS AND PI-ONEERS, DESCENDANTS OF THOMAS</u> <u>BLATCHLEY 1635 -1929</u>.

## 7 April 2025

*I just finished reading the latest Issue of the SDOP News and always enjoy it. Two things came to my mind so I thought I would share my story.* 

My mother, Mildred Francis LILLY claimed to have all her ancestors as Oregon Pioneers. As she was sitting in class with the famous J.B. Horner as instructor, he spoke about Oregon Pioneers. Mr Horner then went on to say that that he didn't have to tell Miss Lilly, because all her ancestors were Oregon Pioneers. She was very proud of that and also because J.B. Horner was well known and respected. They even have a museum named after him.

My other story is about Miss Oregon Pioneer. My great aunt was Leora McBee (husband Coll V. Musgrave). Aunt Lee, as she was called, spent hours going over photo albums and telling me stories of her pioneer family. She desperately wanted me to be Miss Pioneer Oregon, and she even gave me the form. As a typical teenage response, I put the applications in the drawer and forgot about it or trying to be Miss Pioneer Oregon. Some years later, Aunt Lee was gone, I found the Miss Pioneer Oregon application. I was old enough by then to feel bad that I had not given the application a thought. So, I proceeded to try to fill out the form to prove my Oregon Pioneer history. I quickly realized that I had to pick one family for the application, and I could not put all my Benton County pioneers on one page. I picked one of my mother's pioneer surnames (Lilly) and began my genealogical journey. So, at age 23, I became addicted to genealogy. IN those days we wrote lots and lots of letters and enclosed SASE envelopes. We also made lots of carbon copies because copy machines were just beginning to appear. The Everton Publisher big book was a very important tool. Yes, I could have been Miss Pioneer Oregon, and Aunt Lee, I apologize for ignoring your pleas. I have become too old but at least I have honored all my mother's pioneer ancestors. My one regret is the loss of all those photo albums with pioneer family pictures. The moral of this story is when you are asked or encouraged to apply to become Miss Pioneer, do it!!!
