

One of the Earliest Pioneers



Pierre Belleque (1797-1849) was a fur trapper and early settler in Oregon Country. Born in Quebec Province, Canada, he was employed by the British Northwest Fur Company in 1818 in "New Caledonia". In 1821 his employment changed when NWC merged with Hudson Bay Co. From that time, he was an HBC fur trapper. By 1830 when fur trading ended, Belleque settled with his wife Genevieve St. Martin and family at the "Old Henry House" trading post, a.k.a. "Willamette Fur Post" near Champoeg to farm at French Prairie. In 1843 Belleque was a participant in local debates to decide how to form a government. On May 2, 1843, Belleque voted in favor of forming a provisional government. Later a monument was raised at Champoeg to commemorate the signing of the provision. Unfortunately, Pierre Belleque and four other French-Canadians' names are missing from the monument; these among other errors having been recognized over the years. In 1845 Belleque went south to the California gold fields. In 1848 during his return trip, Belleque became fatally ill aboard ship. He was buried at sea off the mouth of the Columbia River.



SDOP History and Ribbons of the Oregon Pioneer Association

The Sons and Daughters of Oregon Pioneers has a very long history, starting back on October 18, 1873 when a meeting was called to form an organization called the Oregon Pioneer Association by adopting a constitution and electing an Executive board. F.X. Mathieu was elected President and J.W. Grim as Vice President. Other officers were: W.H. Rees, Secretary and Eli C. Cooley, treasurer.

It was agreed the annual meeting of the Oregon Pioneer Association would be around June 15 each year, the anniversary date of the treaty settling the controverted question as to whether the whole or any part of the Territory of Oregon should become subject to the crown of Great Britain or an undisputed Territory of the United States. All the pioneer reunions (members of the Oregon Pioneer Association) took place around June 15th of year. The Sons and Daughters of the Oregon Pioneers always had their annual meeting on the Saturday closest to June 15th also until recent years.

The Oregon Pioneer Association thrived throughout the decades of the 1870s and 1880s, sometimes with 1500 pioneers in attendance like on June 16, 1874, in Aurora. As the pioneers began dying off, membership requirements changed to include sons and daughters of the original pioneers, eventually giving way due to the attrition of its members to a new organization known as the Sons and Daughters of Oregon Pioneers, established in 1901. The Oregon Pioneer Association officially disbanded in 1952.

The Sons and Daughters of Oregon Pioneers issued Ribbons at each annual meeting to the attendees. The ribbons below start with the issue date of 1901 (the official first meeting of SDOP) and end with the issue date of 1919. If anyone has ribbons after 1919, please let Chris Meinicke know.



Calvin Tibbets: Oregon's First Pioneer By Jerry Sutherland

When Calvin Tibbets ventured to Oregon Country in 1832 it was looking more British than American. That's because Hudson's Bay Company, the Crown's proxy, had virtual control of the area and some of their French-Canadian employees had retired to farms along the Willamette River. The only Americans there before Tibbets were explorers, fur trappers, scientists, and sailors. His goal was different: to settle Oregon with Americans and make it part of the United States. Tibbets got along with his Canadian neighbors and native tribes long enough to assist fellow American settlers when they arrived: first missionaries, then retiring mountain men, and finally wagon train pioneers who crossed the Oregon Trail in such great numbers that the British finally gave up their claims to Oregon in 1846. Unfortunately, Tibbets died soon after achieving his goal, and all that he had done to achieve it soon faded into the shadows of Oregon history. In making the case for Calvin Tibbets being considered Oregon's first pioneer, this book shines a bright light back on him. New details gleaned from original sources are integrated with previously published, but scattered, accounts of Tibbets' many adventures. Readers will likely learn things they didn't know about John McLoughlin, Jason Lee, Ewing Young, Bethenia Owens-Adair, Elbridge Trask, Joe Meek, Solomon and Celiast Smith, and others who played important roles in early Oregon.

Pioneer Picnic returns to Julia A. Henderson Park



In an article on Pg. 6 of this newsletter, past-President Chris Meinicke writes about early pioneers who gathered to form the Oregon Pioneer Association in 1873 to celebrate the accomplishments of those who endured the Oregon Trail and settled the Oregon Territory.

The spring of 1853 saw Capt. Perman D. Henderson leading a 63-wagon caravan across the trail from Buchanan County, MO to Benton Co, OR. With him was not only his own family but others of the extended Henderson family, including Ira Albert Henderson, aged 20 at the time they crossed the Trail.

1853 was a busy year on the Oregon Trail, and not far behind Capt. Henderson was Capt. William Baird, elected captain of a section of train containing 36 wagons. His own family traveled with him, including his 13-year-old daughter Julia Ann Baird. The family settled in Linn Co, Oregon.

Five years later, the Henderson and Baird families were acquainted, and Ira Albert wed Julia Ann. By the late 1890's they were living in Fossil, Oregon and it was Julia who donated the land which carries her name to this day.

Like the people who formed the Oregon Pioneer Association, and due to the isolation that many settlers experienced in the John Day Basin, there was a desire to have gatherings and to reconnect with friends. Picnics, holidays, and overnight dances would bring families together from a wide area.

According to historic records, in 1899, the year that Wheeler County was established, several residents gathered at a Fourth of July celebration at Kelsay's Grove outside of Fossil. There, they founded the Wheeler County Pioneer Association. Patriotic speeches and entertainment by the Fossil Brass Band were hallmarks of the day. A large feast was also made available at the Donaldson Hotel. In 1901, the annual event was held in what is now the ghost town of Richmond and the following year in Mitchell.

The organization changed its name to the Eastern Oregon Pioneers Association and in 1903 the group selected forty acres at a centrally located site on Service Creek. From that time on, the traditional picnic was held at what is now known as Julia A. Henderson

Park. At the first Pioneer Picnic, Julia Henderson was crowned Queen, and it became tradition to crown a queen each year. In recent years, entire families have been given the honor. For pioneers that made the heroic journey west, the annual picnic is a way to reconnect with friends and loved ones. In the early days of the picnic, many families would bring their wagons and stay for several days.

One hundred and twenty-five years after its inception, descendants of pioneers and the communities that pioneers helped to found will once again gather at Julia A. Henderson Park for the Pioneer Picnic on Saturday, July 26 at 10:30 AM.

Julia A. Henderson Park is located between Fossil and Service Creek near Fossil, Oregon, in Wheeler County. It is at the intersection of Oregon Route 19 and Straw Fork Road, on the right when traveling north on Oregon Route 19. Anyone with early pioneering ancestors in this portion of Oregon, as well as those with a love of our early history, are invited to attend this all-day event.

The association will provide hamburgers, hotdogs, beans, lemonade and paper plates and cups.

The association asks those that come to bring a side dish, salad or desert. There will be ice trays for holding the salads or cold deserts.
